Smokefree Action Coalition Briefing Protecting children from tobacco marketing



Why we want your support for standard packs in the UK

The Smokefree Action Coalition wants the UK government to commit to standard packaging for all tobacco products to protect children from tobacco marketing.

There is good evidence² published at the time the government consulted on this issue that standard packs:

- are less attractive, particularly to young people;
- make the health warnings stand out more; and
- are less misleading about the harms of smoking than current packs.

Smoking is an addiction of childhood – we need to protect the next generation

- Smokers start as children and continue as addicts: two thirds of smokers start before they are 18 and the vast majority while still teenagers: 3
- Every year over 200,000 children in the UK start smoking; 4
- Two thirds of smokers want to guit and many more regret having started; ³ and
- Smoking remains the major cause of premature death and disease killing 100,000 people in the UK each year, more than the next six causes of preventable death put together.

Half of young mothers smoke during pregnancy

- 58% of teenage mothers smoke before or during pregnancy and 36% smoke throughout their pregnancy. 6
- Maternal smoking causes up to 5,000 miscarriages, 2,200 premature births and 300 perinatal deaths each year.


Australia already has standard packs

Since December 2012 all tobacco packs in Australia have been standardised so that:

- The only branding is the product name in a standard font and colour;
- The pack and contents are a standard shape, size and colour;
- Health warnings on the front and back have been increased in size;
- Tax stamps remain; and
- All packs carry the guitline number and web address.
